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Trail Master's Diary: Milford

I always feel a little sad when summer ends. It seems to go by so fast! But since I'm not a big fan of hot, humid weather, I enjoy the cooler temperatures of the fall to get in some walking. It's a great time of year to enjoy the great outdoors! Take advantage of the cool weather and join Walk 'n Mass on October 20 for 5km and 10km walks in Milford. The air should be crisp, and the foliage beautiful. Whether you've walked in Milford before or if this is your first time, there's plenty to see.

The town of Milford was first settled as part of Mendon in 1662, and was destroyed by King Phillip's War in 1676 before being re-settled in 1680. It was incorporated in 1780 and named Milford after the fords of the Mill River that flowed through the town. It became an important industrial and mining community in the 19th century due to its location near waterways and its Milford pink granite. As you walk through town, you'll notice many local buildings built from the granite. The stone has also been used in the main Post Office in New York City, the original Pennsylvania Station, and many other structures.

Both the 5km and 10km routes explore Milford's downtown. Walkers will pass by the Town Hall, which is one of the few local public buildings not made of the famous pink granite. Instead, it is a two-story wood building designed in the Italianate style, built in 1854. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The routes continue past a statue of

General William F. Draper, who served in the American Civil War. He then became a manufacturer of cotton machinery and patented many improvements. Draper also served as a Congressman, and later became president of Draper Company. Walkers then pass through residential areas before heading to Draper Park and the Memorial Elementary School. The routes continue onto the Upper Charles Trail, which will eventually connect Ashland, Holliston, Hopkinton, Milford, and Sherborn along former railroad lines. Enjoy lovely Lake Louisa, where you may see swans, geese, or other wildlife.

5km walkers will turn around at the Lake Louisa gazebo and head back to the finish along the trail, passing Cedar Swamp Pond and ball fields along the way. 10km walkers will continue along the Upper Charles Trail. Be on the lookout for wild turkeys, blue herons, turtles, and more. Enjoy the fall foliage along the way. There's lots to see before you turn around and head back to the finish.

Outside of one slight incline, both the 5km and 10km routes are mostly flat and are on paved surfaces. They have an AVA rating of 1A and are suitable for strollers and wheelchairs. Celebrate fall and take advantage of the cool weather by joining Walk 'n Mass in Milford for 5km and 10km walks on October 20. Enjoy history, wildlife, foliage, and more in this pretty town. Hope to see you on the trail.

Walk Travels: Sicilian Highs

Recently, I wrote about Linda and me walking in the Europiade in Sicily with Walking Adventures International. In addition to providing transportation to Selinunte for the IVV events, WAI transported us to several other locations for overnight stays and walks. Our first experience was in Erice, a mountain citadel on the western edge of the island about 60 miles from Palermo; our last was in Taormina, high on a cliff above the Ionian Sea at the eastern end. Our walks provided contrasting bookends for the trip.

Erice looms above the Western Sicilian plain like a dark, ghostly cowl topped with a crown of ramparts. In the sun it is a crisp grey nest of imposing walls. We approached the town in our bus through a series of switchbacks, Salvo, our driver, blasting his horn at each vertiginous turn to warn oncoming drivers of our approach. Courageous travelers (sometimes Linda or I) could peek down the mountain-side, steeper and more breathtaking with each new direction, at the fields & coastline



At length we arrived outside the town walls, now enshrouded with fog. The bus couldn't

navigate the arch that led up the main thoroughfare, a narrow cobbled street that climbed damply toward our hotel. The stones were slippery but somehow we made our way. We checked in and shortly gathered with our guides and the others on the tour for a walk around the town.

First we descended back to the town gate on those same slippery stones – I was glad I had bought better hiking boots and brought the poles along. At the gate we turned right and proceeded through a woody area on damp but not muddy ground, on a narrow, well-defined path beside the town wall. Where the wall diverged away from us, we continued along the path down an incline toward a

walled clearing, at the edge of a precipice. About fifty yards before us was another hill topped with a small stone building and an antenna. Beyond that, nothing. Just fog. The spectacular sights from the bus were now obscured in the mist.

We continued around the walls, arriving eventually at a set of difficult steps leading to a heavy wooden door. Here we took pictures of one another and imagined generations of invaders, Greek, Roman, Arab, Norman, standing as we were with weapons rather than cameras. History was in our minds, but the mist was in our eyes.

Six days later, we approached the cliff city of Taormina. From the bus it appeared to be a sapphire and emerald ornament embracing the crest of the

promontory. We could also see Mount
Etna, off to our right, grey and watchful. Our
walk began the next morning and circuited
the town. We proceeded down the central
promenade past bright touristy shops, and
into the Duomo and then into Chiesa
Sant'Antonio Abate, decorated with rustic
carvings in a populous nativity scene. From
there we walked into the well-kept municipal
gardens, and then we picked our way on

paths and roads along the cliff edge, stopping at a terrace with a view of the Ionian Sea and Messina dimly off in the distance. Our guides led us back into town for a visit to the Roman theater. We climbed up

to the cheap seats but with nothing playing, descended quickly. Alone now, we concluded with a visit to the recommended Bam Bar, which serves a granita that hits you with just the sort of icy force the shop's name suggests.

You might think of Sicily as unvaryingly sunwashed and stony, but we found there a richness that made us eager to return.

Sadly, a long-time member of many New England clubs, including Two Town Walking Club & Walk 'n Mass, passed away this summer. Valerie was a unique individual who had taught English at military bases and traveled all over Europe while stationed there.

Valerie loved the AVA. She traveled and



walked in all 50 states (only had a few capitals to finish) and enjoyed the events and people she came in contact with all over the country. Valerie

preferred to stay in hostels while on her adventurous jaunts. She believed interacting with the younger generation and folks from various walks of life gave you a positive outlook and made you feel younger yourself. Valerie was a fiercely independent and private person who had deep faith.

Valerie was a prolific letter writer, and her ability to describe events and places was almost poetic. I have practically every letter we received from Valerie over the years. She would regale you with her experiences on walks in New Mexico, Nevada, Canada, etc., and describe the people she met along the way....the folks in the diner, the motorcycle gang at her motel, the people who stopped to get her back on the correct road when she was lost, the farmer who showed her his farm animals when she walked past on her event walk. Valerie was also a volunteer at the Palace Theater in Waterbury, CT. She would write about the programs she saw and either enjoyed or gave you reasons why she didn't. When you met Valerie on a walk, you were sure to be greeted with a big smile and a hug. Valerie never married and had no children, so the AVA was her family.

I had written to Valerie at the end of June, but the letter was returned as "unable to deliver as addressed." I marched down to the Danvers post office because I was certain there had been a mistake. They said this concerned the CT post office. I phoned Valerie twice within one week, but never had a return call. Concerned, but worried that I was sounding like an alarmist, I phoned Carol West of the Connecticut Valley Volkssport Club. She was in Canada on vacation and

phoned me when she returned home. No one had seen Valerie, so another club member, Luiza McDougall and her daughter Heather, drove to Valerie's apartment and learned that Valerie had passed away about 4-6 weeks



before. This was a total shock to all of us.

I wrote this memoriam so you would all know what a special lady Valerie was, but I also wrote this to point out something I have always believed and have stated to family and friends. No matter where AVA/IVV members find themselves, here or overseas, a phone call to a local club will elicit some help or advice from members in those clubs. Walkers are a special group of people, and this scenario convinces me even more of this belief.

Valerie, our friend, you will be missed by your AVA family. Rest in Peace.


